## **Rev Blair Lewis - Profile**

- Rev. Blair Lewis, originally of Prince Edward Island, was ordained in 1976. He first served in an amalgamated six-point charge in the province and since 1996 he has been the staff chaplain at the Queen Elizabeth 2 Health Sciences Center in Halifax.

- His accreditations include Specialist Certification in Pastoral Care with The Canadian Association for Pastoral Practice and Education and clinical training in palliative care in Montreal. A program on Building Skills in Transitional Ministry, which he completed this year, will serve him well as he returns to the pastorate. Also, he has been active on Halifax Presbytery, Maritime Conference and Capital Health committees.

- Blair and his wife Ruth, who have four grown children, are excited about Blair's call to Bathurst and this new chapter of his ministry.

## **Chatting with the New Minister**

### **Q. Had you been to Bathurst previously?**

A. The only time was back 10 years ago when I was travelling VIA Rail. It was during a winter storm so from the train I could see people clearing away the snow.

### **Q. What was your early background?**

A. I grew up in O'Leary, PEI, did my undergraduate studies in sociology at UPEI, then post grad at Dal. in Halifax. I went back to PEI to work in child and family services. I worked with 35 foster children, making sure they did well at home and at school.

**Q. Then what happened?**

A. It was at that time that Ruth and I got married. I decided to apply to PEI Presbytery to enter ministry training so I went to AST (Atlantic School of Theology) in Halifax. I served in a few pastoral charges during that time and was an assistant at St. John's United while I did my post grad work.

**Q. Did you stay in Halifax?**

A. No, I went to Cavendish – Breadalbane Pastoral Charge on PEI. It was a six-point charge so I had three services each Sunday in rotation.

**Q. What was the next chapter in your life?**

A. I went into general chaplaincy work in Halifax with the United Church. Involved were palliative care, mental health, rehab and transitional care.

**Q. What brought you back to the pastorate?**

A. I had been thinking about it for three or four years. As when I enrolled at AST, I wanted to help people as they searched for a sense of meaning and purpose in their lives. The spiritual aspect can help people work through obstacles such as death, disappointments and other losses. I encountered a lot of this with the foster kids who used to ask. "Why me and why am I not with my parents?"

**Q. How did you prepare for this change?**

A. I enrolled in a continuing education course in Ontario. It was a year-long course including online training as well. It looked at the challenges facing the church today and how to help people adapt to change. I was interviewed by a Maritime Conference committee and received my certification last January.

**Q. What was your next move?**

A. I started looking for a pastoral charge. In my search online last spring, I encountered your JNAC (Joint Needs Assessment Committee) report. I liked the way it was put together so I told Ruth Bathurst looked interesting. We came up for an interview in May.

**Q. What were your impressions?**

A. We wanted to attend the church service which we did. We liked the theology and liturgy that we heard. Also, as we were taken around, Bathurst reminded us of Summerside.

**Q. What are some other observations now?**

A. It is obvious how engaged and committed the people are. When I went to the Veterans' Unit I was pleasantly surprised when George Robertson came with me to provide the music. In Halifax, I had to use a laptop for the hymns at the transitional unit. Also, Ruth really enjoyed going to Campbellton last Monday for the UCW rally. I like having greeters at the door on Sunday and someone lighting the Christ candle, for example.

**Q. Do you like the team model we have?**

A. Yes, having the teams is really helpful. It lightens the load for me so I can focus on sermon preparation and other work. My goal is not to come and upset the applecart but rather to collaborate and explore possibilities of what might work. Also, the team approach provides people with the opportunity to use their skills.

**Q. What are your impressions of Bathurst?**

A. Ruth and I like the opportunity to be part of the wider community. We find people are welcoming and friendly not only at the church but everywhere. We attended the BBQ at Holy Family Church and we were introduced to Father Levi Arseneau. We are encountering French spoken in the stores and I find French words I learned in school are coming back. When one of the neighbours came by, we talked about how the two cultures are working side by side. On a lighter note, Bathurst offers a different pace of life and there certainty is less traffic.

## **Ways and Means**

The Ways and Means Sub-team is very pleased with the carpentry and installation of new sinks that Archie Fowlie has completed in the kitchen of Donald Eddy Memorial Hall.

"In the kitchen we now have two deep sinks to handle the big pots and roasters along with four shallow double sinks. Then there's a standard-size single hand sink in the adjoining room. All are stainless steel", said Haines Scott, chairman of the 15 member sub-team.

"Our annual turkey dinner is coming up on Thursday, November 19 when we cook 21 turkeys. It's a biggie but we're ready for it. We're so happy for our clean-up crew and the others, especially having the deeper sinks and improved island", Haines added.

He and his co-workers are looking forward to getting two five foot stainless steel tables to replace the old wooden ones at a cost of slightly more than \$700. If all goes as planned, the new tables could be in use on November 19. In long-range planning, Haines said he would like to see the eight stoves gradually replaced. They are located on the upstairs and downstairs levels of the hall.

This kitchen upgrade was a scaled-down undertaking compared to what was initially included in overall hall renovations a few years ago. Further donations towards the cost are needed and anticipated.

A Harvest of Music featuring local talent was held October 3 to kick off the Ways and Means events for the coming year. The turkey dinner in November is the next project and the 2010 schedule of meals and concerts has been tentatively planned already.

## Annual Remembrance Service

Each year, on the Sunday immediately prior to Remembrance Day, we honour our war veterans as well as those who lost their lives in war.

This year our Remembrance Service at First United will be held on Sunday, November 8<sup>th</sup>. Understandably, there are fewer and fewer veterans to attend this special observance even though all local veterans are welcome. Still some do come and it is an important event for them.

Chad Nelson will be on hand to play the trumpet for the Last Post and Reveille. Bev Murphy says the usual soup luncheon for everyone will follow in the Donald Eddy Memorial Hall.

It was at the Remembrance Service three years ago that our renovated church hall was rededicated in memory of Captain Donald Norval Eddy after whom the building was named 60 years previously. Guest speaker for that celebration was Dr. Alexander Colville, an internationally renowned Canadian war artist during the Second World War.
