Highlights – Bathurst Pastoral Council
November 15, 2016

The last regular Council meeting for 2016 was held in the Eddy Room with Sandra Boone presiding as Council Chair.

Other members present were Judy Losier, secretary; Brenda Parrott, vice-chair; Wayne Lord, Linda Newell, Aldra Carson, Rick Watling, Don Nelson, Pat Brown and Isabel MacLaggan. Also present were Dave Morison, church treasurer and Rev. Blair Lewis who had the opening prayer.

The treasurer presented the financial figures to the end of October. He said local givings were close to budget but the special Thanksgiving envelopes showed a decrease of \$800 compared to expectations. In future, extra envelopes as required will be placed in the narthex.

Dave said overall revenue was “pretty well on track” for the 10-month period, thanks to rental income from government which was received earlier than usual. Net revenue from Ways and Means projects over the period showed an increase of \$2,000 from what was budgetted. Operating expenses were under budget, due in part to the different billing dates.

In his report, Rev. Lewis said three services rather than two will be held on Christmas Eve – 4p.m., 7p.m. and 10 p.m. because there will be no regular service on Christmas Day. He said he is really pleased with the Sunday School situation having come through “a really challenging time”.

The Christian Development Team reported that Heather Chamberlain, Chelsey MacLaggan, Krissy McLellan and Courtney Woods are teaching the three to five year-olds on a rotating basis until Christmas. Jennifer Oliver-Lavigne is having sessions for the older children, tabling the Youth Group idea for now. Pat Thibideau is overseeing the nursery.

Concern was expressed as to the future of UCW since members are getting older and it currently appears there will be no ready successor when Elna Scott completes her term as president in January.

The Pastoral Care Team continues to send sympathy and greeting cards on a regular basis. Christmas cards will go to the elderly and shut-ins. The team extends an open invitation to a pre-Christmas get-together on Tuesday, December 6 from 2-4 p.m. The Linda McPherson group will entertain and will play for the singing of Christmas carols.

The Community Outreach Sub-team, chaired by Lynne Moffitt, will be giving \$100 to each of four local schools again this year. The money goes toward their breakfast programs.

As usual, Don Nelson and his Property Management Team had a busy eight weeks with the necessary repairing, replacing, updating and installation projects. A security lock and buzzer switch for the church office will be installed which, together with the updating of fire extinguishers represent a cost of about \$1500. The snow removal quote is the same as last year. The sanctuary roof is about 20 years old which calls for replacement in the not too distant future.

The Hospitality and Friendship Team will be looking after the serving of refreshments following the Choir’s Christmas concert/hymn sing on Tuesday, December 20 and the Policy and Planning Team will review staff job descriptions in the next few weeks.

There was considerable discussion about the proposed bylaw changes arising out of the recommended restructuring of the national church. The necessary voting by the pastoral charge will take place in the new year.

The next Council meeting is scheduled for January 17.

West Bathurst Cemetery Committee Report

The West Bathurst Cemetery Committee is responsible for the West Bathurst Cemetery on St. Anne Street and the St. Luke's "Old Scottish" Cemetery on St. Luke's Court.

As of November 30, 2016, the "Endowment Fund" balance was \$ 59, 910. The "Endowment Fund" is set up so that only interest generated can be used. We are thankful to everyone who continues to support this fund through PAR and donations so that a total of \$4, 895. was donated to the fund in 2016 to date.

A number of projects were completed in 2016 in addition to the excellent grounds maintenance of the two cemeteries by Shawn's Lawn's and Property Maintenance. The straightening of many gravestones was carried out along with a general clean up of both cemeteries. Recently the records of the West Bathurst Cemetery were updated to include the names and dates on the headstones that were installed this year.

Refugee Sponsorship Update

On behalf of the sponsorship committee, I am pleased to report that all is well with the Syrian immigrants, we are sponsoring. The young family, parents & 2 young boys, were greeted by committee members in February & helped to settle into a small Miramichi apartment. For several months, the parents have been immersed in language classes, while the boys attended Day Care. The father has acquired his driver's license & proudly drives a second hand van. In late October, they welcomed a healthy baby girl into their family & since then, have moved into a small home for more adequate space. The current focus is to help prepare the family for more independent living & to find suitable employment for the father. It is important to note that the committee has been successful in achieving its financial fundraising goal & thanks all congregations for their various forms of support.

Egg Nog

6 large eggs, plus 2 yolks
1/2 cup, plus 2 tablespoons sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
4 cups whole milk
1 tablespoon vanilla extract
1/2 teaspoon grated nutmeg
1/4 cup heavy cream, whipped to soft peaks
Additional grated nutmeg for garnish

Combine eggs, egg yolks, sugar, and salt in a heavy 3- or 4-quart pan, whisking until well-combined. Continue whisking while pouring milk in a slow, steady stream until completely incorporated. Turn on burner to lowest possible heat setting. Place pan on burner and stir mixture continuously until an instant-read thermometer reaches 160 degrees F. and the mixture thickens enough to coat the back of a spoon. Be patient. This should take about 45 to 60 minutes.

Strain mixture through a fine sieve into a large bowl to remove any accidental small cooked bits of egg. Add vanilla extract and nutmeg, stirring to combine. Pour into a glass pitcher, decanter, or container and cover with a lid or plastic wrap. Refrigerate this egg custard mixture to chill at least 4 hours or up to 3 days before finishing.

When ready to serve, pour heavy cream into a bowl and whip until it forms soft peaks. Fold whipped cream into cold custard mixture until combined.

Serve eggnog in chilled cups or glasses and garnish with a sprinkle of nutmeg.
