## Maritime Conference

More than 400 voting delegates attended the 85<sup>th</sup> annual meeting of Maritime Conference which was held May 27-30 in Sackville. Observers and guests added to the number.

The voting delegates from Bathurst Pastoral Charge were Rev. Blair Lewis, Vivien Kierstead, Isabel MacLaggan and Cindy Doucet. Jennifer Oliver Lavigne and Alan Doucet attended as observers.

The five topics dealt with in theme presentations and table discussion groups were radical hospitality, passionate worship, intentional faith development, risk-taking service & mission, and extravagant generosity.

"In a variety of places throughout the Conference and in many ways, we already are immersed in these five practices," stated Rev. Bob Johnson, as president.

"Our coming together affords us the opportunity to be nurtured by one another for improved practising."

Held in conjunction with the four-day meeting were two separate programs for more than 100 teenaged youth.

Two candidates were received into the Order of Ministry during the ordination service on the final day. Another candidate was recognized for designated lay ministry all having successfully completed the required training and interviews.

Succeeding Rev. Bob Johnson as president of Maritime Conference is Ruth Gamble, a designated lay minister in Truro Presbytery. Elected president-designate was Rev. Jane Johnson of New Maryland in Woolastook Presbytery.

Maritime Conference embraces New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, the Gaspé Coast and Bermuda.

## Message from the Finance Team

At some point in people's lives they experience good news and bad news. The church is no different. The good news is great. The Donald Eddy Memorial Hall renovations have been completely paid. Generous donations and dedicated fundraising allowed First United Church to pay off the loan earlier than expected. Thank you!

Our endowment fund, repair and memorial fund accounts are doing well at this time, but unfortunately our local giving's account is not. Local givings pay for the day-to-day operation of First United. The money we give to local givings not only pays for the power, water, phone, salaries and office supplies, it also pays for funerals, baptisms, pastoral care, Christian education, outreach and other critically important needs.

As we head into summer, our expenses continue. Across Canada 42,000 United Church members have signed up for PAR (pre-authorized payments). At First United we had projected a deficit of \$12,000 as of May 31/10. Our actual deficit is \$18,000. We encourage anyone not on PAR to please join. It is safe, convenient and very easy to join. A call to the office is all that is needed to get you started. If every family gave an additional \$5.00 per week, our deficit could be eliminated by the end of the year.

## Highlights – Bathurst Pastoral Council

- ~ Bathurst Pastoral Council met for the first time since the annual congregational meeting in April with Brenda Parrott presiding.
  - ~ It's been 85 years since the United Church of Canada came into being. Our June 13<sup>th</sup> church service will include some of the same hymns and liturgy used at the inaugural service in Toronto on June 10, 1925, Rev. Blair Lewis reported.
  - ~ The annual high school graduation service will be held on Sunday, June 20<sup>th</sup> with Erica Smith, a 2010 UNB graduate, as guest speaker.
  - ~ The minister gave highlights of his one-week study leave in early May, of Miramichi Presbytery's program presentation at Maritime Conference and of his visits to veterans and other seniors with his little dog, Lily.
  - ~ After the rise of Conference on May 30<sup>th</sup>, Rev. Lewis will become chair of pastoral relations for Miramichi Presbytery.
  - ~ He expressed his gratitude again for the help he receives from Pastoral Council, the Council Executive, the various teams and others.
  - ~ As Finance Team Chair, Cathy McLaughlin reported that total revenues at the end of April were \$2500 below budget and Mission and Service givings were down.
  - ~ She repeated the warning that the church cannot continue to operate in the red.
  - ~ Brenda Parrott reported that a "Celebrate Stewardship" program will be held for the five weeks of October. Members of the organizing committee are Rev. Austin Jagoe as chair, Jane Murphy, Debbie McLean, Jennifer Oliver-Lavigne, Bev Murphy, Dave and Cheryl Brewster, Isabel MacLaggan and Brenda Parrott. Rev. Lewis will have a supporting role.
- This special committee was formed after participants at the April 24<sup>th</sup> seminar were told that local givings had decreased every year for the past five years. As a result First United is budgeting for a \$13,000 deficit for 2010.
- ~ The October program will zero in with gratitude on the important presence and role of First United Church and the many types of services and support it offers.
  - ~ Written reports by the Education and Program Team, Worship Team, UCW, Pastoral Care Team showed how active volunteers are in these programs as are those on the other teams as they carry out important work.
  - ~ Jack MacKay was named to the West Bathurst Protestant Vault Committee succeeding Blair Chamberlain.
  - ~ Reporting on the spring meeting of Miramichi Presbytery, Isabel MacLaggan said the program centered around the national anniversary theme, "The United Church at 85: Rooted in the Past – Visioning for the Future".
  - ~ The next meeting of Bathurst Pastoral Council was set for Tuesday, October 5, 2010.

5. No, only two thirds of the Presbyterians voted to unite.
6. Yes, in 1968 the Canada Conference of the Evangelical United Brethren voted to unite.
7. Rev. George Pidgeon, originally of New Richmond on the Gaspé Coast of Quebec.
8. Mardi Tindall whose origin is Ontario.
9. St. Luke's Presbyterian and Trinity Methodist.
10. No. It was in 1941, 16 years after that the two became one even though initial steps were taken in 1927.
11. Yes. The two congregations had met together for joint services on several occasions. Thus they embarked on a commendable course of dwelling together in unity as First United Church.
12. The onset of the Second World War resulted in a decrease in active membership with so many men and women enlisting for active service including the minister at St. Luke's, Rev. Herman Campbell.
13. The St. Luke's manse on St Patrick Street was sold a few years after amalgamation. St. Luke's Church was used for regular services and Trinity Church remained as a Chapel for weddings, funerals, Sunday School and mid-week groups. The Trinity parsonage on Murray Avenue was kept with the minister, Rev, Harold Bishop continuing to reside there.
14. Eventually the chapel was demolished and Donald Eddy Memorial Hall was officially opened in 1947. Later. The parsonage was taken down as was the First United Church building. The new edifice, attached to the hall, was officially opened on November 15, 1998.
