

Happy Thanksgiving 2021

As I write, the inaugural *National Day for Truth and Reconciliation* is now history. It, having been held, on Thursday, September 30th. That, however, doesn't mean our indigenous friends and the legacy of residential schools will fall off the radar for the next twelve months. We, on the contrary, may hear even more.

Because, well, contrary to what's written (or not) in our history books, our indigenous friends have been more involved in our lives than we might think. Recently, while preparing for this *Greeting*, I became even more aware of that. It's interesting, I find, how new information can influence our way of thinking. And, not just theologically.

First things first, though. Do you know when we, living here in modern day Canada, first celebrated Thanksgiving? It was the pilgrims, right, back in 1621, when they gave thanks for the end of a drought and a bountiful harvest? Well no, that actually happened at Plymouth, Massachusetts. Therefore, not within the confines of our country at all.

The explorer Martin Frobisher, then? As the story goes, he and his crew, in 1587, gave thanks and communion was observed, either on land at Frobisher Bay, in present day Nunavut, or on board a ship anchored there. They dined on salt beef, biscuits, and mushy peas and gave thanks for their safe arrival in what was then known as Newfoundland. Forty-three years, I might add, before the aforementioned first "American" Thanksgiving.

Then, on November 14th, 1606, Samuel de Champlain held huge feasts of thanksgiving between local Mi'kmaq and the French. Although not known by the settlers at the time, cranberries, rich in vitamin C, what they called *petites pommes rouge* (little red apples), are credited with helping them avoid scurvy.

And so, we settlers here were the first to celebrate Thanksgiving, right?

Well, not so fast. Traditions of giving thanks long predate our arrival here in North America. First Nations have had traditions of thanksgiving for surviving winter and receiving crops and game as a reward for their hard work for some time. These traditions include feasting, prayer, dance, potlatch, and other ceremonies, depending on those giving thanks. Geographically, needless to say, the area in question is huge.

And so, guess what? We, nor the Americans, were first. Furthermore, it's likely the neighbouring Mi'kmaq introduced the French to cranberries.

Champlain appears to have recognized this. His feast became more than an annual affair. To prevent the scurvy epidemic that had decimated the settlement at Ile Sainte-Croix in past winters, the *Ordre de Bon Temps* (Order of Good Cheer) was founded, offering festive meals every few weeks—with *medical articles* recommending better nutrition and entertainment to combat the deadly disease. Scurvy, ironically, caused by the lack of vitamin C.

Who, then, in addition to firstly God, and then, family and friends, might we be thankful for this time around?

For me, the answer is clear. Our indigenous friends, hands down.

The question being, how will they know? How can they be shown?

My hope and prayer is that we'll figure that out, and soon, through a working group, that's been set up within our Christian Development Team. If you'd like to be part of the conversation, please let Martha Vickers and/or myself know. We'd love hear from you.

Finance Team

The committee met on September 27, 2021. The church has a loss of \$31,000 to September 30th, with the expenses being in line with the budget. Revenue is \$42,000 below budget due to a lack of fundraising.

<u>Church envelopes</u> for the coming year will soon be available. If you haven't had contribution envelopes in the past and wish to have them for 2022, please advise the church office. Another way of making contributions is through PAR.

PAR: Pre Authorized Remittance (PAR) is a convenient way to support the ongoing work of your church. Your monthly contributions are taken directly from your bank account or charged to a Major Credit Card. Currently we have 95 households using this method of support. Signing up for PAR takes only a few minutes and can be done for you at the church office. All that is required is a void cheque or your credit card information.

West Bathurst Cemetery Team

The West Bathurst Cemetery Committee is responsible for the upkeep of the West Bathurst Cemetery on St. Anne Street and St. Luke's "Old Scottish" Cemetery on St. Luke's Court. committee, whose members include: Robert Branch, Chairperson; Heidi Jansson; Byron Mclean; Robert Willis and Gary Branch, Secretary; met on May 5, 2021. The committee agreed to hire Shawn's Lawn and Property Maintenance for the 2021 mowing season. A spring clean-up of both cemeteries was completed. Four burials took place at West Bathurst Cemetery this year to date.

The Public Works Department of the city of Bathurst was contacted about the damage to the gate and fence at St. Luke's Cemetery from snow being piled on both by the city plow. Public Works replaced the fence and moved and repaired the gate to prevent further damage.

On June 5, 2021, our committee was contacted by Bathurst City Police about a car accident that had caused damage to the gate, fence, and a gravestone at West Bathurst Cemetery. An estimate of

\$10,322.40 to replace/repair the gate and fence was obtained from Expert Fence. Also, an estimate of \$517.50 was obtained from Maritime Monument Works to repair and place the gravestone back on its base. A police report was required to proceed, so with help from Hugh Schryer this was obtained on August 5, 2021. Since the driver was not insured, an application to the "Uninsured Automobile Fund" was completed and mailed on August 12, 2021 and, as of now, we still have not received a reply to our request for financial assistance.

A special "thank you" is extended to those who continue to support the West Bathurst Cemetery with their donations or through PAR donations. A total of \$2,425 has been donated so far this year.


