Easter Greeting 2023 from Rev. Neal

As I write this, the first three Sundays of Lent are behind us and we're preparing for the fourth. As I understand it, if everything goes according to plan, our Easter Newsletter will be in your hands by sometime next week. Just over a week, before Palm Sunday.

The question for me, then, continues to be this. At what point should I jump into the [Easter] story? Now, later, or perhaps, even earlier?

Not to worry. The decision has been made. As this piece forms part of the Easter newsletter, we'll do it all. From Lent 1 through Easter Sunday, that is, not to mention, the Season of Easter to follow.

And so, here goes...

The Season of Lent begins in the wilderness, a place that feels both familiar and dreaded. While we tend to emphasize the loneliness and desolation of the so-called *wild*, wilderness times aren't necessarily empty and barren alone. No, just as a wilderness can be swarming with life, our wilderness times can astound us with the energy they hold as well. Remembering always, our lives can feel clarifying and renewed as we find new awareness within ourselves too.

We begin, then, in the familiar landscape of the wilderness with the tempter's questions to Jesus. That growing awareness then shifts from Jesus to Nicodemus' assurance of the Spirit's deep care and self-giving love in the winds of change and new birth. From there, we continue to uncover new awareness of ourselves in the questions asked of and by the Samaritan woman and the one born blind. If we hadn't noticed before, we begin to see there are companions in the wilderness who encourage our survival as well.

Just prior to entering Jerusalem, as dry bones are called back to life and Lazarus emerges alive too, we find ourselves in the wilderness of grief, asking harrowing questions of God and ourselves. Through that, we hear the call to liberate each other. No one asks these questions alone, but having said that, we share the dream of what new life will actually look like once that's been done.

Then, with a vision and hope, we join the chorus of voices that cry for justice on Palm Sunday. There, we realize how much we've changed and continue the transformation into the fifty days of Easter.

As always, Easter arrives, dressed in white and gold and a flurry of alleluias. Its actually a feast for our senses when Mary becomes the first witness to Jesus' resurrection. Thomas, then, uses his hands to proclaim his faith, and *two* see the risen Christ, as bread is broken and shared. We, with that, come into our senses as we contemplate life continuing beyond the tomb, beyond doubt, beyond trials.

In stories from the Acts of the Apostles and the early Christian church, we reflect on what truly brings life, what it means to live in community—and—the costs and risks associated with proclaiming God's truth. Through that, we find new meaning in what it is *that* we believe, and find strength, in the prayer of Jesus for all disciples, as we continue the Christ-life.

The great fifty days, of course, culminate in celebration, as we experience, with the first followers, the lifegiving work of the Spirit.

And there it is...

Friends, my Easter wish is that we too will celebrate, as we experience the life-giving work of the Spirit—in both seeing *and* doing. And always.

Council Highlights from February 2nd and March 14th, 2023 by Isabel MacLaggan

The council has held two meetings in the New Year. At the most recent one, conducted on-line, council reviewed and approved the proposed budget for 2023. Such approval was necessary prior to the budget being presented to the congregation at the annual meeting held March 19, 2023.

At the earlier meeting council reviewed the church's financial status as of December 31, 2022. The net income last year was in the minus category.

Church treasurer, Dave Morison, explained a self-insurance arrangement proposed and supported by the United Church of Canada. This effort by the national church is aimed at reducing annual insurance premiums which have been increasing year after year thus burdening pastoral charges. (See separate story) Both our Financial Management Team and Board of Trustees have decided to embrace this national plan.

Nominations chair, Rick Watling, reported that Lester Scott has agreed to be a member of the West Bathurst Cemetery Sub-Team.

The Christian Development Team, chaired by Brenda Parrott, reported on plans to have the Sunday-school children sing at the Palm Sunday service. The minister asked members to encourage people to return to regular church attendance.

On behalf of the Pastoral Care Team, Gwen Sturgeon extended special greetings to Herman Comeau when she visited him on his 100th birthday in January.

Reporting as chair of the Ministry and Personnel Team, Wayne Lord said the annual staff reviews had been completed.

Council approved an updated policy pertaining to funerals at the church.

Lester Scott, chair of Property Management, gave an update on the new audio/video system being installed in the sanctuary that will result in live streaming.

Also reporting for their respective teams were Martha Vickers on the church's regional structure; Wayne Lord, Ways and Means Team; and Isabel MacLaggan, Board of Trustees and Communications

West Bathurst Cemetery Team

The West Bathurst Cemetery Committee is responsible for the West Bathurst Cemetery on St. Anne Street and the St. Luke's "Old Scottish" Cemetery on St. Luke's Court. Committee members include: Heidi Jansson, Byron McLean, Robert Willis, Lester Scott, Robert Branch (Chairperson), and Gary Branch (Secretary).

As of December 31, 2022, the West Bathurst Cemetery Fund total was \$82,792. We continue to be thankful to everyone who supports this fund the PAR and donations. In 2022 the donations totalled \$3,210 and the investment income was \$746.

The committee will be meeting in April or early May to explore options for the 2023 mowing and maintenance season.

United Church Phases in New Insurance Plan

IN THE FACE of skyrocketing insurance premiums, the United Church is committing \$3 million to a self-insurance program that was phased in on Dec. 1. The program, which eliminates broker fees and streamlines costs, is expected to significantly reduce insurance expenses. Approved at General Council 44 in July, the new plan aims to save congregations and ministries over \$1.5 million per year.

Erik Mathiesen, executive office of finance for the General Council office, estimates that insurance premiums for congregations have increased between 50 and 100 percent during the last three years. It's the third highest expense for churches, behind staff and building costs. There will be a 15 to 30 percent reduction in premiums for congregations transitioning from the older UCC Protect program.

Self-insurance means participating United churches will assume some of the risk. Still, Mathiesen says, it's a conventional practice. "Self-insurance isn't a wild, radical idea or anything. It's very common."

Nancy Gray, chair of the finance committee at Munn's United in Oakville, Ont., says she's pleased with the United Church's intention to forge ahead with the plan. "We hope to see reduced costs, with similar or better service and coverage." John Morton, the treasurer at Bella Coola pastoral charge in Bella Coola, B.C., adds, "Its financial success will rely on low claims in the early years, but also the participation of as many congregations as possible."

"All UCC Protect participants in good standing qualify and will be switched over automatically unless they expressly opt out," says Mathiesen.

Pastoral Care Pantry & Peanut Butter Drive

An appreciative audience of more than 80 people enjoyed a two-hour afternoon concert held in our First United sanctuary on March 18th.

The Treble Makers, under the direction of Linda Knowles MacPherson, joyfully sang song after song, most of which were **Irish** tunes.

There was no admission fee. However, donations of peanut butter for the Bathurst Volunteer Center and non-perishable items for the church pantry were requested. Those in attendance were generous in their response.

The concert was initiated by Gwen Sturgeon of the Pastoral Care and Membership Team. Community Outreach, a sub-team of Pastoral Care, saw the church pantry filled to the brim as donations included dozens and dozens of welcomed items.

In expressing her thanks to the vocal and instrumental group since the concert, Gwen also mentioned *the humour* that was part of the program. "Such a wonderful contribution of the group's time and talents was enjoyed by all in attendance who generously donated to our collection of items for those in need".

The concert attracted people from as far away as Campbellton.
