#### Miramichi Presbytery Fall Meeting – September 10, 2016

Miramichi Presbytery, the church court between the local pastoral charge and Maritime Conference, met at First United Church for its first meeting since May.

Miramichi Presbytery comprises 16 pastoral charges from Blackville and Black River northward to Tide Head and Upsalquitch and along the Chaleur Bay coast of Gaspe Peninsula in Quebec.

Special guest was Rev. Catherine Stuart, president of Maritime Conference. She was introduced by Presbytery Chair Marion Green of Tabusintac Pastoral Charge. She delivered a challenging message and presided over the serving of Communion.

Reports were given by the various committees of Presbytery beginning with Pastoral Relations by Rev. Blair Lewis. He reported that Dave Allan is serving as a student minister in Loggieville/Black River Pastoral Charge for an eight-month period. Dave has a Master of Divinity degree from Emmanuel College in Toronto.

Rev. Lewis announced that he was withdrawing as chairman of this committee to take on other duties in Presbytery and Conference. He has chaired this committee for six years after being co-chairman of the same committee in Halifax Presbytery for 17 years.

The new head of Pastoral Relations is Rev. Sue White of New Bandon Pastoral Charge. Rev. Lewis was named chairperson of the Education and Students Committee. Kent Gibbons, diaconal minister in Dalhousie/New Mills Pastoral Charge, is commencing duties as co-chairman of Presbytery.

Wayne Mullin of Chatham Pastoral Charge gave an update on the Presbytery-sponsored Syrian refugee family that arrived in Chatham earlier this year. He said language classes are progressing well and the father is in a custodial role.

A fundraising variety concert is scheduled for First United in support of this refugee project. It will be held on Sunday, October 23 at 2p.m. Wayne said it is likely a second refugee family will arrive during 2017. A generous donation towards this second sponsorship has been received from a longtime member of Miramichi Presbytery.

Christian Life and Growth Chair, Ann McCosh of Chatham Pastoral Charge, introduced Kyle Grant who is taking youth ministry studies through Atlantic School of Theology (AST) in Halifax. Originally of Tide Head, Kyle is a resident of Bathurst and has been working in various locations for Atlantic Superstore including Bathurst.

Also, Jason O'Hearn of Campbellton/Escuminac Pastoral Charge attended the September 10 meeting as a youth delegate. Both Kyle and Jason, a Campbellton High School student, have attended for several years the special youth programs that are held in conjunction with the annual Maritime Conference sessions in Sackville.

As treasurer, Dave Morison of Bathurst Pastoral Charge submitted his report showing Miramichi Presbytery to be in a satisfactory financial position. There are investments as well.

At the request of Presbytery, a soup and sandwich luncheon was served by First United UCW in honour of the visit of the Maritime Conference president.

The next meeting of Miramichi Presbytery is scheduled for January 28 with February 4 as the storm date.

### Highlights – Bathurst Pastoral Charge September 20, 2016

A quorum was declared by Vice-chair Brenda Parrott, who presided in the absence of Council Chair, Sandra Pentland.

Also attending this first Council meeting since May were Judy Losier, secretary; Dave Morison, Church treasurer; Ian Oliver, Elna Scott, Wayne Lord, Linda Newell, Aldra Carson, Rick Watling, Don Nelson, Pat Brown, Isabel MacLaggan and Rev. Blair Lewis who gave the opening prayer.

The treasurer presented the financial picture to the end of August. Total revenue was \$147,178 compared to the budgeted figure of \$146,583 for the eight–month period.

Dave explained that additional revenue came from a new rental and from the use of Donald Eddy Memorial Hall for the municipal election. Generally speaking, total givings were on budget as were the Mission and Service Fund receipts. Operating expenses were less than what was expected. This is dependent on the different times that bills are due.

As to memorial church bulletins, it appears the average donation is \$25. Bulletin covers accounted for a \$1472 expenditure compared to revenue of \$585. Rev. Lewis suggested a 25 cent saving per fifty covers could be realized by ordering past year bulletins. It was decided the next bulletins will be ordered using this suggestion.

Wayne Lord of Ways and Means Sub-team said two big dinners are coming up – the Beef BBQ on September 29 and the annual turkey harvest dinner on November 24.

Don Nelson, Chair of the Property Management Team, said that with help of Lester Scott, Alan Wilcox stripped the floor of the sanctuary during the summer. He said roof repairs would not be necessary because the annoying pigeons are not causing damage since food is no longer an attraction in the neighborhood. Council addressed a serious security concern affecting First United and other churches in the area. Stricter precautions will be looked into by Don Nelson to supplement what has been done already.

Elna Scott, president of UCW, spoke about the members supplying lunch on Anniversary Sunday, at the Miramichi Presbytery meeting and for a funeral reception. The UCW has decided that the Memorial Hymn Sing will be held every five years instead of every three years. An amount of \$2,000 has been forwarded to the Church's general fund for 2016.

Rev. Lewis reported that Jennifer Oliver Lavigne is interested in starting a youth group. Her valuable contribution as Sunday School Superintendent was recognized. He said that those interested in Bible Study should notify the church office so the study packets can be prepared on time for the first meeting on Tuesday, September 27.

Aldra Carson said the Hospitality and Friendship Team meets informally. In addition to the weekly after-service food and fellowship time, the Team held a reception following a small funeral. She said a birthday cake, donated by Jessie Horsley, was served marking her 93<sup>rd</sup> birthday on September 4.

Isabel MacLaggan gave highlights of the September 10 meeting of Miramichi Presbytery and of the last meeting of the Board of Trustees.

The next meeting of Council was set for Tuesday, November 15.



A Syrian family of four: mother & father with 2 young sons, was warmly greeted on one of the coldest nights of the year. Since then, with the support of a multitude of volunteers & an interpreter, the family has become well settled in their new home, an apartment in Miramichi. The parents undertook language training, while the boys were enrolled in day care & we soon learned that the mother is pregnant & that her due date is October 17th!

As a liaison, between the organizing committee & the congregations of First United Church & Central United Church, I am delighted by the degree of local support, exhibited through monetary donations & contributions of household furnishings, all of which helped enable the committee to fulfill its sponsorship responsibilities. All congregations have been encouraged to undertake fundraisers to continue our support, so I am happy to announce that a Variety Concert will be held on Sunday, October 23rd, 2 PM at First United Church, Bathurst. ## West Bathurst And St. Luke's "Old Scottish" Cemetery Update –

The cemetery committee met on April 27, 2016. It was moved by Heidi Jansson and seconded by Robert Willis that "Shawn's Lawn and Property Management's" estimate of \$2400. be accepted for mowing the two cemeteries from the end of May to the end of September. A work morning was held at the West Bathurst Cemetery on May 14, 2016, and an evening clean up of St. Luke's "Old Scottish" Cemetery took place on May 24, 2016. Other ground's maintenance has taken place during the summer and a number of gravestones have been straightened. The person who carried out the work is a mystery to the committee so if you can help us with the worker's identity, please let us know so we can properly thank the person or persons.

Donations continue to come in for the cemeteries "Endowment Fund" which as of August 31, 2016 has a balance of \$58,230. and has grown by over \$9,000. since the official fund raising campaign ended in 2014. Thank you to everyone who continues to support the "Endowment Fund". This fund will help ensure the proper maintenance of the cemeteries for years to come.

The committee is also interested in repairing the broken and toppled gravestones in the St. Luke's "Old Scottish" Cemetery located at the end of St. Luke's Court, and is planning on starting this project in October. If you have some time to volunteer, please contact Gary Branch (546-9208).
