SCRIPTURE READING


(Based on Isaiah 11:1-10)

Hello. My name is Isaiah, and I am a prophet. A prophet is someone who tells people about God. A prophet wants all the people to listen and learn about who God is and what God does. Life is difficult for the people of Judah, where I live. The people of the land are afraid and sad that other nations are trying to take over, and they feel that God is not listening to them.

I was thinking about all of this, and suddenly a picture came into my mind. I know that God wanted the leaders and people of Judah to hear about it.

The picture was of a tree that had been cut down; it was just a stump, its life and beauty gone. But from the root of that tree, a new branch would grow, and it would become a strong tree again. I told the people not to give up hope; just like the new branch that grew from the stump of the tree that seemed dead, a new leader would come. This leader would have the spirit of God and all of God's knowledge and understanding. This person would be happy and really enjoy knowing God by seeing and hearing about all the good things God has done and will do. Caring for the poor and teaching bad people to be good would be something for this person to do.

The rest of my story was about what would happen if God made all things good and safe. I told about a mountain where no one would be hurt, and all the animals would live together. No animal would hunt and kill another animal for food. All the animals would live peacefully on the mountain, and a child would lead them on the mountain. The child would teach the world about God and all the good things God can do. No one would harm or destroy anyone or anything else on this mountain. Everyone and everything in the whole wide world would know about God. They would know that God is everywhere, even in the biggest ocean. They would know that all the people have been a part of God's plan, and all the people will be a part of that plan in the future.

Advent Message from the President of Fundy St. Lawrence Dawning Waters Regional Council November, 2022



When I was just a lad I was afraid of the dark. For me, when the sun went down, every rug became a pool of quicksand ready to entrap me, every creak or groan from our old home meant there was an intruder in the house, and every closet contained a monster ready to pounce on me should I walk by. Now you might be thinking that lots of children are afraid of the dark, but for me it was debilitating. I regularly refused any invitations to sleepovers, my bedtime routine had to be completed before dark, and once I was in bed I refused to get out until dawn. I lived in fear most of the year, but not at Christmas. As the days of advent drew closer, beautifully lit decorations appeared on lawns and every room in the house was aglow with Christmas trees and candles in the windows. During advent and Christmas my fear was gone and it changed the way I lived and acted in this world.

I am no longer afraid of the dark, but this world is still a dark place and we have to face that darkness every day. We face dark days of disappointment. We lose a job, a relationship, or our health. Frankly, the holidays can exaggerate the disappointment. The holes in our lives can look a little bit bigger under festive Christmas lights.

We face dark days of stress. We're overwhelmed with responsibilities and with little time to complete them all. Our schedule is full. Our wallets are empty. Our bodies are exhausted.



And again, the holidays can just make it worse. Our schedules get fuller, our wallets get emptier, and our bodies get more worn out.

We face dark days of doubt. The world around us is full of uncertainties. Inflation is robbing us of our buying power, Russia is still at war with the Ukraine, COVID is still a threat, and we live with the specter of climate change. It's easy to look at our future and doubt what it holds. We wonder if our job will be around tomorrow. We wonder if our health will hold up. We wonder if we will be able to make ends meet. And, once again, the holidays give new intensity to these concerns.

We face dark days of depression. We can feel like our whole world is ready to cave in. Maybe you faced a crisis this year that brought it on and now you wonder, "Does anyone really care?" Feelings of depression are so common during the holidays that we have a term for them: "The Holiday Blues."

The world is a dark place, but listen to what the Bible says in Isaiah 9:2 "The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of deep darkness a light has dawned." Notice that it doesn't say from the world a light has sprung, but upon the world a light has dawned. It has come from outside. There is light outside of this world, and Jesus has brought that light to save us; indeed, He is the Light.

Throughout Advent the light grows as lights begin to appear in town squares, on Main Streets, and in homes. These lights are not merely decorative, but symbolic of the truth... the truth is that we cannot save ourselves. Thinking that we can only leads to more darkness. The only hope is if light comes from the outside, and at Christmas, we learn that Jesus is the light that has come (John 8:12), and the sun has begun to dawn (Isaiah 9:2). This light brings life, truth, and beauty. It brings life- He is the source of both our physical and spiritual life. His light brings truth, revealing things as they really are (1 John 1:5-6). It brings beauty as it reveals the heart of God (Luke 2:11).

When I was a lad, I was desperately afraid of the dark, but I knew when Advent coming there would be light; I knew that no matter what room I went into, the light would be there. The trouble is, not everyone knows this. John 1:9-11 says "The true light that gives light to everyone was coming into the world. He was in the world, and though the world was made through him, the world did not recognize him." The same is true today.

Advent means "coming," and in this season we prepare for the coming of Christ. It is a time not only for remembering the coming of Christ in Bethlehem, but also for seeking to recognize Him when he comes to us now.

Jesus lives in our own times and in our own lives. Yet, too often, He is a stranger to us, and we fail to recognize him; we are not prepared.

How can we begin to prepare?

- Stop I know it's tough to stop running and slow down during this season. It's one of the busiest times of the year. But remember what the psalmist says: "Be still, and know that I am God" (Psalm 46:10 NIV).
- Spend Time with Him How do you spend time with God?
 - a. **Pick up that Bible and read the Christmas story in Matthew and Luke**. There are all kinds of Advent reading lists. Find one and use one. God always speaks to the person who is willing to listen and the Bible is the Word of God.
 - b. **Take time for a Bible Study**. Often a Bible Study will allow you to hear and see very familiar stories with fresh eyes and new wisdom.
 - c. **Go to Church**. Spend time getting to know God and getting to know His family. Do you have time to spend with God this Christmas?
- 3. **Say Thanks** Spend some time expressing gratitude to God for sending Jesus to the world for you. How do you do that?
 - a. **Pray** Thank God for all the blessings you have in your life. At Christmas, God gave us the greatest gift imaginable, so let God know what that gift means to you.
 - b. Help Others Jesus once said "Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me." So, spend some time helping others as a way to say "thank you" to God. There are all kinds of ways to help others whether it is through the United Church's Gifts of Vision, getting involved with a local soup kitchen, or shoveling a neighbour's walk, there are numerous ways to help others. Choose one closest to your heart.

When I was a lad, I was afraid of the dark, but when Advent came around, the lights dispelled the darkness. I had nothing to do with those lights appearing, but they came and they transformed the way I lived. Isaiah 9 doesn't just say "For unto us a child is born." It also says "to us a son is given." It is a gift. If you are prepared to accept this gift of grace it will change your life. It is my prayer for you that Jesus will be born in your life this year.
