As I write, we're about half way through the Season of Lent. The Gospel of John, for the most part, being our travel companion this time around.

I say "for the most part" because, we actually began with Matthew—with Jesus in the wilderness—before switching over. Then, in John, we encountered Nicodemus and through his interaction with Jesus, we too were assured of God's care in the winds of change and new birth. Then, we sat on the edges with a woman from Samaria as she drew from the well of life-giving waters. This coming Sunday, hopefully, we'll see the movement of the Spirit in our lives and in the world around us in the story of one who is born blind. Then, we'll experience the pain of a community in the death of Lazarus. Later, we'll join the conversation that unbinds and brings forth life. Later yet, we'll enter Jerusalem on a path paved with cloaks and branches—a path that leads to betrayal, abandonment, prayer and violence. One, seemingly, that comes to an end with the closing of a tomb.

Last year, at this time, we were discerning our path as a new ministry together, and not sure of what that might be. I can tell you, though, not for a minute did I think it would involve a worldwide pandemic that would pretty well shut everything down—including our First United Church building.

Earlier, I mentioned the story coming to an end at the tomb. Seemingly, at least. But, as we know, that's not how it went. It, instead, was a beginning.

Some, over the past few days, have shared with me their "questioning our God" regarding COVID-19. Wondering aloud, how this could be? How could God let this happen?

I respect their honesty. I respect their choosing to discuss it even more. To discuss alternatives. An understanding of God, for example, as being one of presence with us. That God is not the cause, but—a huge part of the solution. That resurrection—is new beginnings.

For the past number of days, I've seen God's presence here in our community and beyond. People, as they often do in situations like this, going out of their way to be at their very best. Concentrating largely on what's truly important! Not so much, on what's important for us as individuals.

Once the gloom of our own Good Friday passes, as it will, I look forward to new beginnings—more, perhaps, than ever before.

First United Church COVID-19 Response

As we continue on our Lenten journey toward Easter, we find ourselves on another unexpected journey. This new COVID-19 journey is filled with uncertainties, potholes, challenges and sometimes fear or anxiety.

During this troubled time, the council of First United Church has had to make some tough decisions and changes to the routines and activities of our church. Our primary concern must be the safety and health of our church family and our wider community in general. Our council is very mindful of the recommendations issued by the government and medical community regarding social distancing and other precautions in its attempt to limit the spread of COVID-19 and will be adhering to those recommendations as closely as possible.

Therefore, the following measures will be put into effect as of March 17, 2020.

- Our church office is now closed.
- Our office administrator will check and address any messages which may have been left on our answering machine.
- Regular Sunday services in the Sanctuary have been cancelled until further notice.
- We will continue video streaming of our Sunday service through our website (www.firstunited-bathurst.ca) and Facebook group.
- Extra CDs of our services will be available to those who are unable to access internet. Just make a call to the office to make arrangements.
- You will be receiving regular voice mail messages, and emails to keep you updated on the situation and any changes which may be required.
- Our website and Facebook group will be updated regularly to keep you up to date.
- Rev. Neal and the Pastoral Care team will make regular telephone contact with those who may be ill, shut-in or in need of their services.
- Rentals will be cancelled for the immediate future.
- We will review these measures regularly and make any changes as they become necessary.

NOTES:

Many people in our community may be experiencing hardships, challenges, anxiety, fear etc. during these uncertain times. Please check in on those who may be in need and let Rev. Neal (655-7592) or the Pastoral Care Team (Pat Brown 546-4322) know of anyone who may need some assistance with the new challenges of life (or just a listening ear) so that we can make contact and offer our assistance.

Easy Paper Easter Wreath



Supplies

Paper plate
Spring and Easter themed/colored paper
Glue
Glue Dots
Ribbon (we used a 7/8" wide craft ribbon)
Egg Cookie Cutter or oval cookie cutter
Scissors

Note on cookie cutter: the cookie cutter used for this project was for 4 inches high and 3 inches across the middle—we traced the inside of the cookie cutter.

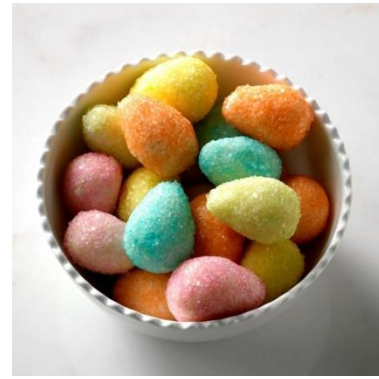
Directions

1. Cut the inner portion from the paper plate, so that you have the outer portion intact.



2. If your paper has a design on it, turn it over and trace the cookie cutter onto the paper for a template.
3. Cut the eggs from the paper and glue onto the back of the paper plate wreath.
4. Cut a piece of ribbon, make a bow, use a glue dot, and attach to the top of the wreath.
5. Cut another piece of ribbon, form a loop, use a glue dot, and attach to the back of the wreath.
6. Hang and enjoy for Easter

White Chocolate Easter Egg Candies



Ingredients

1 package (10 to 12 ounces) white baking chips
3 ounces cream cheese, cubed
1 teaspoon water
1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
Colored sprinkles, colored sugar

Directions

In a microwave-safe bowl, melt the chips at 50% power. Add the cream cheese, water and vanilla; stir until blended. Chill until easy to handle, about 1 hour. Quickly shape into 1-1/4-in. eggs. Roll in sprinkles or colored sugar. Store in an airtight container in the refrigerator.
